What is CAMP?

Steps to Apply

- 1. Complete eligibility checklist to see if you qualify
- 2. Complete and submit WVC admissions application <u>www.wvc.edu/apply</u> select option 1
- 3. Complete and Submit CAMP Application with required forms and documentation

CAMP Eligibility Checklist:

Must be US permanent resident or US Citizen
Have a high school diploma or GED
Enroll full-time at WVC (15 credits/quarter)
Be a first-year incoming student with less than 20 credits, unless completed credits through running start or college in the high school
Participated in the Migrant Education Program MEP or HEP in K-12 and has a certificate of eligibility(COE #)
OR either student or parent has worked in a

Migrant/Seasonal farm for 75 days or more in the last 24 months

<u>OR</u> participated in National Farmworkers Jobs Program
